Eddie Allinson – A Tribute

The death occurred recently, in October, of Eddie Allinson of Meir Heath, who in years past served our community both as a Parish, and Borough Councillor. He was also a School Governor for Meir Heath Primary School in its early years. Fulford Parish Council wishes to express its sadness at Eddie's passing, and extends its condolences to Eddie's widow, Christine.

Chairman's Report

The council has resolved to achieve "Quality Council" status and as part of achieving this, the council has initiated the preparation of a "Parish Plan", which will be the result of consultation and cooperation with parish organisations.

We have just completed the first phase of the Parish Plan process. We issued a sample questionnaire to approximately 80 residents of

Fulford Parish and had an excellent response from the community. We thank all who completed their form and gave us valuable feedback.

The next phase is full consultation, initially by a questionnaire, the cost of which has been funded by the Community Council of Staffordshire. The analysis of this feedback will also be used to set the goals and objectives for Fulford Parish Council for the next four years. This questionnaire will be hand delivered to all households in the Parish and can be returned by FREEPOST. The document will also be available online but will require the responders to provide their full postcode to validate their submission, and additional copies will be available from your local councillor.

The individual responses will be treated in confidence. Most of the questions can be answered by ticking boxes, although

comments are welcome. Please take time to complete and return the questionnaire; the Parish Council really does want to know your views!

Your Parish Council and You

Your council is bound by Act of Parliament, and can only do that which Parliament grants it authority to do. It must do what parliament requires it to do.

The law gives parish councils lots of scope in choosing activities to undertake but surprisingly, there are very few duties that they must carry out.

Your parish council must however ensure that the rules for administration of the council are followed. WE MUST:

- Appoint a chairman responsible for the smooth running of meetings, and ensuring that all council decisions are lawful.
- Appoint a clerk to advise us, and as an administrator.
- Appoint a responsible financial officer. In our case the clerk carries out this duty.
- Appoint an independent auditor.
- Hold a minimum of four meetings a year, one of which is the Annual General Meeting.

We at Fulford, being a large parish, feel we need to meet monthly in order to get through our busy agenda.

- Council meetings must be open to the public, and we must make the meetings accessible to all who wish to attend. We must make documents open to the public in the spirit of the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

The rules for councils may seem too many and too complicated but remember that they are there to protect people's rights, and make for a properly run authority.

Rules for Councillors

All councillors must sign an agreement to abide by the code of conduct adopted by the council.

Councillors have a duty to attend meetings when summoned to do so. The notice to attend a council meeting is a summons in law; a summons means you have a duty to attend. We must keep ourselves properly informed about issues to be discussed so as to use sound judgement as to what is best for the community. We represent the whole electorate, not just those who may have voted for us, or with whom we share a special interest!

The Parish Council

The Parish Council have consulted with Forsbrook Parish Council with regards to the condition of Blythe Bridge railway station. They have been in contact with the various departments of the railway network and improvements to the station are being discussed at the present time. We will keep you informed of further developments as we receive them from Forsbrook Parish Council.

Spring Bulbs

Spring Bulbs have been donated by the Parish Council to be used in the area; Mrs Malvern the head teacher of Springcroft Primary School has kindly agreed for the school children to plant the bulbs, which will give a colourful display of flowers in the spring.

Speeding

County Councillor Ian Parry has asked for volunteers to help with operating speed guns throughout the parish – if you are able to help, please contact Ian Parry. Volunteers have already been identified from Stallington

Village – more are needed to help with this very important safety aspect.

Car Parking

There are continuing problems with parking outside our schools. Would you please be aware of other road users when parking your car and also of the danger to children caused by irresponsible parking, especially on the grass verges? Parents taking and collecting their children from Springcroft Primary are able to use for a short period of time, the car park opposite Blythe Lodge in Ridgway Drive and also the Creda car park opposite the school on Grindley Lane. Gareth Hilditch our community police officer is continuing to monitor these problems.

Estate Based Strategy

The EBS meeting held at Springcroft Primary School was a huge success. Stafford and Rural Homes tenants were able to discuss all work that needs attending to on their properties, and all choices for renovation work such as new bathrooms, kitchens, drives, garden

improvements and parking facilities. The work is due to start within the next six months.

We have asked again for more dropped kerbs in the Blythe Bridge area as this is needed for

people with wheelchairs, scooters, and for mothers with pushchairs.

Meanwhile, we extend the Season's greetings to all Blythe Bridge residents.

Rough Close Ward News

The Common

Permission has now been granted by DEFRA for the erection of permanent stock-proof post and wire fencing across the “bottom” common including three kissing gates, four bridle gates and four stiles and erection of similar fencing of the western tip of the common incorporating a stile and gate. We now look forward to the next stage of this project commencing.

Dog Fouling

Representation has been made by residents regarding the condition of the commons in relation to dog fouling. The dog warden visited the area last month ago to view the situation. Dog poop bags and bins have been provided together with signs that clearly state that owners must clean up after their dogs. The penalty for not clearing up dog fouling can

be up to £1,000 if taken to court, but there is also provision for a fixed penalty scheme with a fine of £50 in England. We urge all dog owners to use a doggy bag, or a carrier bag, to pick up the faeces. Ideally, this should then be placed in a designated dog bin. If this is not possible, take the bag home or, as a last resort, double wrap the faeces and put in a normal litterbin. Please contact the dog warden on 01785 619402 or your councillor with any concerns.

Speeding

Community Speed Watch volunteers from within the community are being sought to assist Councillor Parry with identifying locations to enhance existing enforcement activity. If you feel that you would be able to assist with this activity, please contact the Clerk or your local councillor.

Neighbourhood Watch

Now that the clocks have gone back and the dark nights are with us again, please be extra vigilant regarding bogus callers. Always illuminate your door and only open it with the safety chain on (if you have one fitted). If you

do not recognise the caller, ask for proof of ID and do not let anyone enter your home if you are unsure of their credentials. 62% of all burglaries occur at the back of your properties. Doors and windows are the first line of defence – remember to keep them securely locked.

Gypsy Site

The Royal Courts of Justice have granted the owners of the site the right to appeal against the Inspector's Report that upheld the planning enforcement notice.

Highview Road

The play area at Highview Road has been identified as a priority for the coming year as part of Stafford Borough's play area refurbishment programme. The play equipment will be brought up to the European Safety Standard, a sign will be erected and benches and bins will be installed. Stafford Borough Council maintains 76 play areas throughout the Borough area and the opportunity for our facility to be upgraded must not be missed.

School Parking

A real effort has been made by staff and parents to reduce the parking outside the school by parking at the Village Hall.

Village Green

Thanks to the Borough Council, and at the request of local residents, the posts around the Village Green have been replaced.

Stallington Village

A number of issues are outstanding on this development:

Open Spaces:

In recent weeks the residents on the Stallington Village estate have highlighted to the Parish Council several issues related to the condition of the open areas. This follows

Persimmon Homes completion of the building works. Of particular concern are the commitments that Persimmon made to residents in providing play equipment for use by the younger population, building materials still littering the site, and that the kick around area had stones and bricks sticking out, that were a potential danger to users. On the 18th October, residents attended Stafford Borough Council Open Forum event in Fulford Village Hall. The above points were discussed and senior members of SBC Environmental Services Department agreed to follow up and visit the site later in October. It appears that Persimmon Homes has now handed over the maintenance of most of the open spaces on the site to "Greenbelt" - a Glasgow based maintenance company. This is evidenced by the presence of contractors clearing away dead foliage, cutting down the heavy weeds, and generally improving the condition of the site. This has all occurred over the last month.

Roadways:

We are told that the wrong grade of tarmacadam was laid by Persimmon contractors, and that this would all need to be replaced as a matter of urgency.

Stallington Village Roundabout

It was expected that the roundabout (on the junction of Stallington and Fulford Road) would have started by now. The latest information is that this work is scheduled to commence in spring 2007.

Stallington Hall

There have been several reports of youths driving up to Stallington Hall and causing

damage to the property in the middle of the night. Some residents may remember that a fire was the result of such activities approx two years ago.

The police have been alerted to this anti-social behaviour, and neighbours in the area have been asked to record number plates and notify police of any suspicious activity.

Permission has been granted for 6 new dwellings on the old Stallington Hospital site. These dwellings will mean the conversion of a currently derelict stable block, and will almost certainly be an improvement to the current environment.

Neighbourhood Watch

Many residents of Stallington will have heard that John Dearden, Stallington's Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator, sadly passed away recently after a short illness. John was a friend to many, and his funeral in Hilderstone Church was well attended by many who knew him.

Residents of Stallington are currently raising money for a memorial bench in honour of John's extensive commitment to the community. If anyone would like to make a contribution to this worthy cause they should contact Cllr Tim Beasley (07803 117235).

Meir Heath Ward News

Grindley Park

Our council has commenced discussions about the provision of new play equipment on Grindley Park, to replace that which was removed a few years ago, following the damage to it by vandalism and the considerable problems of anti-social behaviour at that time.

The council has been reminded since then that we have a responsibility to provide play/leisure facilities for young children, and older ones up to their early teens. Consequently we have been evaluating the large range of equipment which is on the market, including of course, the costs. At this stage we think that a fenced area containing equipment suitable for children up to 10 years of age is needed, with some additional equipment, unfenced, for those over that age, say 10 to 14 year olds.

The costs of such a scheme will be considerable, so it is thought that a phased installation may be necessary, to spread such costs over a period of time, depending on

whether we could get grant aid to help fund this project.

The precise siting of the equipment has not yet been finalised, but it is likely to be near to, or on, the site of the original playground.

We are currently seeking advice and guidance from Stafford Borough Council, whose staff have considerable experience in the provision and running of such facilities. We shall report further on this matter as things progress.

Meir Heath councillors, along with those in all other wards, are in regular discussions with our local police, to improve road-safety provision, and to combat illegal parking (often done with no consideration of pedestrians), and general anti-social behaviour in our area.

Meir Heath and Rough Close Village Hall

Work is nearing completion to extend the village hall which, when complete, will provide the community with an enlarged meeting room and a Parish Office.

The larger meeting room will provide much needed extra space for current users as well as then being able to cater for a wider range of activities and uses.

Police community support officers (PCSOs) are uniformed staff whose role is to support the work of police officers and work within their local community. Their role is to assist the police in areas that need a certain level of police presence, but not necessarily the expertise of a trained police officer. They free up some of the time police officers might spend on routine tasks or low-level crime issues, and provide a valuable service to the community.

They may help with issues such as:

providing a visible and reassuring presence within communities

attending incidents of disorder, nuisance and anti-social behaviour

dealing with community issues such as littering and dog fouling

checking out abandoned vehicles

gathering evidence through observation

helping with missing persons enquiries

speaking to young people who might be drunk and causing problems, confiscating alcohol and tobacco, if necessary

crowd control and directing traffic at public events

helping direct traffic at road blocks or scenes of accidents

assisting police with recording names and addresses or door-to-door enquiries.

PCSOs spend most of their time out on patrol, usually on foot or possibly also on a bicycle. They work in pairs or small teams, and in liaison with their police officer colleagues. In some forces they team up with police officers, managed by a police sergeant. They do not have the same powers of arrest as police officers, although they do have the right to detain suspected offenders for up to thirty minutes until a police officer arrives. They carry radios so that they can communicate with police control rooms and other colleagues.

Winter Warmers

“Now is the Winter of our Discontent”

Shakespeare may not have meant the phrase in a modern context, but we must all be feeling discontented at the way household fuel prices have shot up this last couple of years!

But are our houses leaking heat unnecessarily? Some of the best, and easiest, ways of saving on bills are the simplest, such as blocking unwelcome draughts for instance, with the many cheap and easy to fit products on sale. We all have loft insulation these days (haven't we?), but to be effective your loft should have at least ten inches of insulation.

Cavity wall insulation is cheap and easily installed, and can save up to £160 a year on bills. Anyone in receipt of benefits may be able to have this done free, or at a reduced charge. Far too many of us are using the old fashioned light bulbs when the modern low-energy ones are far more efficient. Although they are initially more expensive they can save you money in the long term. Similarly, thermostatic radiator valves can be bought and fitted for under a tenner, and save you overheating rooms which are not being much used, or upstairs ones which tend to be warmer as heat rises. Again, you will save money and energy, helping yourself, and helping to prevent global warming. When it is time to change kitchen appliances don't forget to look for those that are “A” rated, which are very energy efficient.

Renewable Energy:

Global Warming is probably the greatest danger to our planet, and many World leaders believe that we must act now to avoid disaster in the near future! Renewable energy is the buzz-word these days, when it seems that we will soon run out of oil and gas worldwide.

Manufacturers are now getting their act together, and whereas once it seemed that only large schemes were viable, micro-renewable technology is now being sold in D.I.Y. and electrical stores, off the shelf. For instance a wind generator for your home can cost from £1500 fitted, and solar panels are also available, which may be rather more expensive, but, having no moving parts, are likely to last much longer, and can give you virtually free hot water the whole year round. Solar panels do not need direct sunlight and can be efficient on dull as well as on sunny days.

Our latest information on planning permission is that if you wish to erect a wind generator on a pole in your garden you will need planning permission. However if you plan to put it on a wall a phone call to the planning office may well be all you need to do.

With wind and/or solar power in the home entailing a fairly high capital cost the Low Carbon Buildings Programme www.lowcarbonbuildings.org.uk offers funding for micro-generation, including households. It is managed by the Energy Saving Trust www.est.org.uk.

The Energy Savings Trust estimates that micro-generation of energy could provide 30-40% of the country's electricity needs by 2050.

For more information on home energy saving and generation, you can phone your local energy advice centre free on 0800 512 012.

Brown Bins, Green Waste

We know that the instructions are on the leaflets provided, but we have been asked to emphasise that these bins are for garden waste only.

Please, NO cooked food, cooking fat, oil, stones, rubble or turf. Many other substances are listed in your booklet. If our bins contain any unsuitable materials they may not be emptied. Similarly, if garden waste is put into green bins the operatives will not empty them either.

Green Box, Kerbside Recycling

Paper – in a carrier bag; Cans – in a carrier bag; Textiles – in a carrier bag; Glass bottles and jars – loose in the box; Clear plastic bottles – loose in the box.
